# Smithfield 2020 Notes from Team meeting of February 7<sup>th</sup>, 2018

#### **Present**

### **Admin**

Current funds balance is \$12,679.85. There are no outstanding commitments of funds.

The Historic District business representatives nominated Jim Abicht and Mark Hall to serve terms expiring February 2021. A motion to re-appoint Jim and Mark to the Team was adopted. (Note: January meeting notes misidentified the reps whose terms expire this month.)

## **Project and initiative updates**

Parking in the core of the Historic District was discussed, prompted in part by the Special Use Permit granted by the Town on February 6<sup>th</sup> for an event venue on the 300 block. The problem set is defined as a typical warm season, business hours (10-5), mid-week day; explicitly excluded are event and Farmers Market days and the current utilities work.

Initial comments: There are few complaints made to the Visitor Center or businesses about parking. However, informal observations and anecdotal perception point to:

- \* Many merchants or employees consistently park on the street 10 to 5;
- \* Local residents drive on if parking is limited, particularly in the 100 and 200 blocks (visitors are more "motivated" to find a space since this is the destination);
- \* North Church Street is becoming problematic with short-term stops at Cure;
- \* Locals will avoid the Post Office in favor of outlying counters, e.g., True Value;
- \* Off-street parking is difficult for visitors to identify because of lack of consistent signage;
- \* The 300 block's recent surge of new businesses is a positive development, but an event venue will consume the limited availability and will impact residents as well as visitors.

A 2020 effort will collect and analyze two sets of data – actual count of available on- and offstreet parking, and the number of on-street capacity consistently used by residents and business owners and employees. Data for the noted areas will be collected by Team members:

- \* N. Church Street from Main to Luter Dr, and Wharf Hill Lee and a recruited volunteer
- \* 100 block, including Inn, BSV and TUMC lots Jim and recruited volunteer
- \* 200 block, including Taste, lots behind businesses and across from PO Judy and Trey
- \* 300 block down to Underwood Christi and Sheila

Target to collect the data and submit to Rick is February 28<sup>th</sup> for review at the March 7<sup>th</sup> Team meeting.

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Town Council will be briefed on 2020's data collection and analysis plan at the February 27 Public Buildings & Welfare committee meeting. An initial recommendation will be a joint Town staff / 2020 working team to develop a signage plan. The result of the data analysis and specific recommendations will be presented at the March PB&W committee meeting.

Team members will also research through whatever means practices in other localities, from 2-hour parking to resident stickers to ... and share results at the March Team meeting.

The follow-up with Town and County staff to January's lessons learned briefing by Joseph McCain, co-owner of Fleur de Fou, is in progress; no meeting dates with staff have yet been set but Tom will advise of an opportunity to observe a pre-application meeting with County staff. Rick took for action inviting Town Planning, Engineering and Public Works Director William Saunders to a Team meeting to brief relevant ordinances and planning considerations.

#### **New initiatives**

A motion to subscribe to the Roger Brooks Destination Development Association for one year and pay the \$395 fee from Economic Vitality Initiatives funds was adopted. (The Roger Brooks Webinars offer common sense and best practices advice on business district revitalization efforts.)

## **Organization updates**

Historic Smithfield: The 1750 Courthouse reported a best-ever financial performance in 2017, due in large measure to the Christmas in Smithfield fundraising programs. The fiscal health of the Courthouse is sound.

County: James River Christian Academy is under new ownership and the County has secured a \$30,000 Community Development Block Grant for a feasibility study of possible re-use of the property.

Tourism: Restaurant Week was a success. Farmers Markets will re-open in April. A new event, an art show hosted on the Smithfield Station Boardwalk, is being developed in partnership with the Arts League.
